READER.

Ourteous and Impartial Reader, I here present you with the Second Part of this most useful and necessary Piece of Astrology, wherein I have used all means possible to gratifie thee; tis true the Subject is not common, I mean as to the Method of it, but I Presume it is the most Exact of any as to Astrology, that ever was taught in England, or by any, that could ever speak the English Tongue ; neither had this come forth at this time, but by the fole Affistance of that famous Mathematician, and my loving Freind, Mr. Cordwell Worral, whofe Care and partly his Pains gave Life to this Piece, which foon received Motion, he having been acquainted with this kind of Learning among the Persians and other of the Eastern Sages, where they are so Dextrous, that they can tell a Person the particular Bransactions of his whole Life, and for the time of Death they feldome Err, but we here in England cannot pretend to it, nay we do not know after a person is Dead the direction that Kill'd, by the common Method that is now practiced, as hath been proved by many Nativities where the Astrologers hath promised long Life, and the Natives somtimes have dyed in heir Infancy, or at least 20 or somtimes 30 Years before the direction could operate, which they could have to Kill, which things hath produced a Scandal upon the Art, and Artifts; nay I believe if Heraclitus and Democritus, should view the Methods

thods that many of our Artists take, they would find exceeding great cause for their Lamenting & Laughing at them & their Prastice, because their Method is not demonstrable, which thing after I had given my felf to the Study of Astrology, for the space of 10 Years I began to doubt of the Certainty of it by realon I often found it to faile, at last it was my good hap to meet with the Ingenious Thomas Moor Elq. who in discourse on that Subject made it apparent, that there was little truth in that way which was commonly practized, and by his means I was brought to be acquainted with the Learned Dr. Wright who was the first in England that ever underftood this Method, which he learned by being conversant in the Works of that Learned Monk Placidus, where in his Celestial Philosophy, he hath laid down and truly explained Ptolomy's Writings, which till then laid very obstruse, so that as I faid by conversing with Dr. Wright I was confirmed in my judgment, and fo came to know truth from fallbood, by what I learned, likewife from the aforefaid Mr. Worral and being willing to oblidge all the true lons of Uraina, I was willing to Publish it, and I hope I have done things with that plainness that it may be well understood by the meanest Cappacity, and also have given such Examples as may Explain the whole matter, with the greatest ease imaginable; and truly. I do not doubt but those of understanding will aprove of this Labour of mine, but Ignorant Zoiles will Contemn it, for the old Proverb is, he that Builds on the High-way, will here many things from them that find fault, and especialy the Vulgar, but I wish those Thrasoes would put forth fomthing more Excellent, before they find fault with, and Carp at the Labours of others, wherefore let none Rafbly judg of this Work until he be throughly informed of the same, Iknow it is contrary to what hath been taught, by Regiomontanus and Argol, whose Doctrine is insipid, but for his laborious work in Framing those Excellent Tables the World is much ingaged to him, and we are no less Ingaged to our Famous Coun-

try Man, the Famous and Learned Mr. Coley for his Incomparable Clavis but I hope this may be a Foundation for the Ingnious ta Build A Mighty Fabrick upon, whofe Top may Pierce the Spheres, and like Jacobs Ladder to reach through the Stary Region, I could will that some more Noble Pen had been Imployed, in doing fo great a Piece of Service for the World, but none having attempted it, I have presumed to make this Essay; and if it meet with a kind acceptance, I intend God willing to add forthing more gratful, which this Age never looked after, for we have been like the Dog in the Fable, never to look after the Substance of things, but are content to take up with the mere (badows, nay and not only so, but often Villifie them that make it their business to diffipate those Clouds of Ignorance, which are between us and the Beautious Urania, but let such dull Animals injoy their Opinions, for to those I doe not write, but only to the Ingenions who will make Reason their Judge, as for such let their Names be Eternal to dwell above Spite, Scorn or Reprosch, but for the Evill Heads, who Envieth the Knowledge that cometh from others, and wish all to be in dulnefs, like themselves whose Heads are full of nothing but Chimera's their Hearts of Revenge and Mallice, and their Mouthes of nothing but Railing, let them Continue in their Ignorance and Folly, for I Envy not their Principles nor their Glory in their Art, and if any fuch there be that will oppofe any part hereof, I am R.eady to answer them, not in Railing but Modesty, that so I may reform him or those from their Erronious Way, and fo Aftrology fall beget a good Efteem, as it had formerly, when and where the true Principles were practiced, for I doubt not but Ptolomy whole Method this was, had the Quintesence as to Art (for if we may Credit the Sayings of that Famous Mathematician Dr. John Dee.) he was taught it by an Angel, but how ever he came by it, his way is the most Demonstrable, whose layings I have indeavoured to bring into practice, now if any through mistakes should Err, let him

Nativity is the true Time, or the very Moment of any ones Birth, in which the Child comes into the World, begining then to be a visible Member of the Creation, the Stars begining then to Act and Operate, by the 1 Nati-Power of the Angel, or Angels ruling those Constellations, arifing, or then being in Greatest Power at the time of the vity. Birth, according to the Saying of St. Jerome, when he cometh to Comment upon the 18 of St. Mathew and the 10th verse, faith thus; Great. is the Dignity of Souls, for every one at their first appearance into the world, have an Angel appoynted for their Custody, and fafety; But leing the true Time is hard to come at, by Reafon of the difference and uncertainty of all Clocks, Watches, and Dyals, the Antients have left feveral wayes to Rectify it by, as the Tructine of Hermes the Animoder of Ptolomy, and alfo by the AcciThe MARK OW

This Houfe hath fignification of the true Defcription of the Natives body, as to form and Stature, with the Temperature, and qualities of the Mind, it is called the first Houfe, or East Angle, from whence is Judged the begining of every Enterprise it is the first Cardinal Houfe, and hath fot its Triplicity the 5th and 9th which behold each other by \triangle Aspect, in World; where is made this Rational division, of the Houfes; from whence the true mundane aspects do proceed, this is the first and chiefessential place, for any of the givers of Life, to be placed in, it is in * to the 11th and 3d. Houfes and in \Box to the 10th, and 4th. To that when it is Directed to the body

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or

body or opposition of any Planet, there the M.C. comes to the \Box ; the Afc. is fometimes giver of Life in a Nativity. which when it is the evill Directions thereof to the Malificks, fignifies great Sickneffes, and by being Directed to the Anaretta it fignifies Death ; and this is to be observed only when the Afc. is giver of Life; and not elfe, but we know it is and hath been the opinion of all our Modern Authors, to fay that the \odot or) may be givens of Life, and the Afc. being directed to the bad Alpects of the maleficks denotes fickness, nay fay they and most commonly Death, which is the most fenfeless argument in the World, to think that one fhould be giver of Life, and a nother to give Difeafes and it may be a third to kill, which we canot a flow of, for whatfoever is giver of Life that fame is most Certainly, to be directed for ficknefs and Death, but to this fome will fay we must not be too fevere in Judging, upon the giver of Life, and that the Afc. being directed to a bad Afpect of the Infortunes, al though it be not giver of Life, yet it shall have Power to kill, this makes Ptolomy's Doctrin void, concerning the giver of Life, who faith no ill direction thereto shall kill if it be not giver of Life, and therefore there shall be but one certain giver of Life, which our late Authors cannot make, corrospond, which must make agreat confusion in Art (which Ptolomy never taught) they fay likewife we are to refpect the Principal giver of Life, (and fecondly, the Afcen.) and when either of them come to any bad direction it shall have power to kill, but we one the contrary fay, that wholeever shall have powe of giveing Life, by his polition shall keep and preferve the Life, by his force and ftrength, and no other shall be able to deftroy it, viz. If the o be giver of Life, whether the Afc. • or part of \oplus fhall have any power (by being directed to bad Afpects) to kill; understand the fame by the) Afc.

or \oplus when any of them are givers of Life ; therefore all Difeases in general or particular are taken from the giver of Life, and none elfe, as shall be further Examply fied in its Proper place, fome again will admit of feveral givers of Life, and fay that those Nativites who have most givers of Life are the most fortunate, and receive the most power, for the prolonging of Life, but is contrary to fence or reason, for where there is more gives of life then one there is more evil directons of them, to the evil rayes of evil planets and fo confequently more evil fignified thereby for that Nativity mult needs be of a more inferiour condition, and of a fhorter life that shall have more givers of Life then one, fometimes they will direct the Afc. to ill Afpects to kill, when as the o or) being giver of Life are fortunatly placed to which the direction properly belongs, but for a conclusion of this House Note that the Afc. is never to be directed but to those Afpects in the World, and not in the Zodiack. nor to parallels but to all those in the World, alwayes observing the Lat. in Mundane directions, neither can the Afc. or M.C. be directed to any Afpects converfly, I have been the larger upon this House, because by what hath been faid here may be observed in the other Houses, however I will give an Epitomie of all in breife & c.


THe use of the preceeding Tables are fo eafy, that they need but little explanation, yet neverthelefs, I think it convenient to fay fomthing of them, to fhew their use, and likewise how they are made ; fo that if you fhould have occasion for any other Latitudes, than what is here incerted, you may plake them your telf, which is thus; if the Star or Planet have North or South Latititude, you are to obferve the Declination, which if it be under 10dg. you may take it by Argols Primum Mobile, or Mr. Gadbury's Doctrine of Nativities, but if it be 10dg. or upward of las. you are to work by Trigonomitry, according to the Method of the Ingenious Mr. Coley, in his Clavis Aftrclogia; and having found the Declination under the Pole of the Place, you must observe that if the Declination fall in any of the 6 Northern Signs, add the difference of Algention to godg, and you have the femid. Arch, in deg. and min. but if you fub. the difference of the Afcention from 9 dg. you will have the feminoct. Arch : but if the Declination should fall in any of the 6 fouthern Signs, fub. the difference of Afcention from 90dg. and you will have the femid. Arch; but if you add the difference of Afcention to godg. you will have the feminoct. Arch ; which when you have obtained, if you divide it by fix, you will have the hourly Times, or the length of the true Planetary Hours, and if you divide the femid. or feminoct. Arch by three, you will have the true diffance. of one Houfe; and fo by that Method obtain the true division of all the Houses according to Ptelomy; 2 of which Parts

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Parts makes a *, as may be feen by the Table of Mundane Afpects; where is laid down-all-the Afpects, that are made in the World ; The finding of the femid. or feminoct. Arch, is thus, under the lat. of the place, you have the femid. Arches of all the Northern Signs, as γ , 8, π , on the top of the Table, and for $\mathfrak{D}, \mathfrak{A}, \mathfrak{M}$, in the Table ; now having obtained the femid, Arch, the feminost Arch is obtained thus, by fub. the femid. Arches, may be eafily converted either into hours and minutes, or degrees and minutes, by the Table for that purpose, which I need fay no more of in this Place.

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



I find it to be 16dg. 33m. which is the fecondary diftance, which I fubstract from the primary distance, and there refts the East Distance, which is 4dg. 15m. now because the secondary distance is less than the primary, I add this east distance to the Arch of direction. Houfe, he being in \times a watery Sign, must needs give a flux of Humors, with a Feaver, I suppose I need not incert the manner of the Direction, becaufe I have faid fom thing of it elfewhere, and befides, I hope by this time, the Reader will be able to do the like upon any other of the like occasion, and fo by a little Practife, amongst our Ingenious Professors, this most fublime Art of Altrology, will be practifed in its true Method; which Divinative Art 15, and hath, been the molt abused of any Art under the Celeftial Canopy, by a parcel of bare pretenders, who perhaps may form a Scheam, but when they have done, know no more now to give Judgement, (notwithstanding their Twenty one Years Experience) then those who ask the Queffion, only they have got fome of the inneceffary I erms of Art, with which they tell a fair, Story, the whole time stareing the Querent in the Face Austerely, and fo deceive the World; neither should it be exposed to fuch common Uses, as our Non-Artists about this City put it to; and as I faid before, notwithstanding their 21 Years Experience, in all that time have not learned 21 Grains of Sence, which may properly be referred to this ingenious Art, the understanding of which they fo much pretend to ; yet this we must acknowledge, we are extraordinarily beholding to 3 or 4 of our Famous Country Men, who by their learned Volumns, have made known to the World, that which before they knew not, as that most Ingenious Piece of Art, entituled Mr. Coley's Clavis, and that Laborious and incomparable, Mr. Gadbury's Doctrine of Nativities ; thus I conclude my twenty Genitures, with fome Cautions worthy of Obfervation, by the Ingenious Aftrologer, as well for the Judging of Horary Figures, as Nativities, which are as followeth.

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Cautions worthy of Observation.

r ft. N TArrowly observe all the Aspects, as well those in the World, as those in the Zodiack, for many times a Zodiatal Alpect may promife good in the Bufinefs, when there may be a Mundane Alpect will frustrate the good promifed by the other, and that is the Reafon: our Artifts to many times fail in their Judgment; alfo Parallels in this cafe, are to be carefully heeded, whether they be Parallels of Declination, or in the World, for by thole Parallels, many times the Planets affume other Natures, for 9 or 4, by being in Parallel of 5 or 3, may take their Nature fo much, that they are wholly Infortunes; these things being observed, I doubt not, but Aftrology, will obtain as much Creddit, as now it doth reproach, which is not occasioned by the Art, but by the Artift; for it had the Venerable Effeem of many Famous Perfons, (even in the first Age of the World) if we may believe that Famous Antiquary, Josephus, and I doubt not but most of the Patriarcks were well acquainted with this kind of Learning, but we in this Age are fo ftupid, to think, that it is a thing by chance or lot, and not to be much relied upon, for fay they, the Astrologer looks no farther than the Stars, and by their motions and a spects, he maketh a Judgment according to his own fancy, and he tells us a story of 1, and 3 being Infortunes, and of 4 and 9 being Fortunes, when the Stars are at that vaft diffance, that it is almost impossible we should feel any of their Influence.

To which I anfwer, when the Almighty had finished the Creation, he made Laws and Bounds to every part thereof, and the \odot) and Stars he made for Signs, for Seafons, for Days, and for Years. *Gen.* 1. 14. and then it follows

follows, they were also to give light upon the Earth:Now by reason they were for Signs, confequently they mult Signify fomething, and God in the 5 of E/a. 14. hath this fharp Sentence. Therefore my People are gone into Captivity, because they have no knowledge. and Solomon faith, the wife Man falleth forward, but the fool falleth backward, that is the wife Man (according to Ptolomy's faying in his Cent. Apho. 5) fall, but he forefees it, and is prepared before it comes, but the Fool never regards it till it is upon him, and fo is taken like a Bird in an evil Net; now I would not be mifunderstood in this place to tie a fatal necessity upon the Stars, knowing that he that made them, can counter-mand their Power, neither do I think, that the Stars in themfelves have any Power to Act or do any thing, no more then the Body without the Soul; for it is not from the Stars, that we have Coldness, Dryness, Pestilence, Famine, or Plenty, or any other thing either good or bad, and yet they are the Signs of all these Things, and in this I must forfake the Opinion of Placidus, whole Words are used in the first part of this Book, who faith, The Stars cannot be Signs of Effect, unlefs they be Caufes alfo: but then you will fay, how can that be, or from whence do the Caufes proceed? (I answer) from those Governing Angels which are as Watch-men, appointed to Execute the Will of the Almighty, and that there are Seaven of those Angels, (according to the Number of the Planets or Erratick Stars) is plain from Scripture, for in the 8 of the Rev. and the 2v. St. John faith, And I (aw the Seaven Angels, which food before the Prefence of God, and to them was given Seaven Trumpets; and when they came to Sound in their Order, fome fmote the Scas, another the Trees, and the other darkened the Sun, and every one as they Sounded, produced heavy Judgments among the Inhabitants of the Earth, and St. Paul in the 1 of Heb. and the 14 faith, Are they not all mimistring Spirits,

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Spirits, fent forth to Minister for them who shall be Heirs of Salvation; and if for ministring Spirits to the Godly, undoubtedly, they are likewife Scourges for the Wicked ; for when Balaam went about that unjust Exercise, the Angel ftopt him by the way; and when the rude Sodomites . went groping about the Street, they knew not the Reafon. but might well fuppofe it fome giddynefs of Brain, when it was the Angel that findte them with Blindnefs ; likewife when the Agyptians first Born were all struck dead in one Night, the Aftrologers would Judg fome ftrange Configuration of the Planets, but it was done by an Angel: Had we feen those thousands of the Ifraelites fall fo fuddainly of the Plague, we should have been apt to attribute it to fome fuddain infection of the Air, but Holy David faw it was an Angel with His Sword drawn; thus humane Reafon is apt to afcribe Events to wrong Caufes, attributing those things to an ordinary courfe of Nature, which the God of Nature doth by Supernatural Agents; and that every Country, City, nay, and every particular Perfon, hath his or their, governing Angel is verv plain, for who can think any other, but that the Great God loofeth much Glory by our Ignorance; for how can we give him the Honour due to his Name, while we conceive too narrowly of Him, and his Works: To know him as he is, is past the Capacity of our finite Understand. ing, we must have other Eyes to differn that incomprehenfible Goodnefs; but to fee him in his Divine and Miraculous Works, is that whereof we fhould be inquificive ; neither is there any thing in the World, that can fo much import us; for if we could conceive aright of this fenfible and material World, it is enough to amaze the most enlightned Reafon of Humanity.

For if this Globe of Earth, in regard of the immence Greatness, be accounted a World? what shall we fay of

of ASTROLGY.

fo many thouland Stars, which are for the molt part fo much bigger than the Earth? how then I fay can we but admire fo many thouland Worlds of rouling Light, continually over our heads, made by the Omnipotent Power, and all regularly guided by the Infinite Providence of the great God, how flenderly muft that Man think of the workmanship of the Almighty, that looks upon all thefe but as fo many Torches fet up in the Firmament, only fo bigg as they feem; and contrarily with what awful refpects muft he needs be carried to his Creator, that knows the vastness and perpetual motions of those Glorious Bodies, ruled and upheld by the mighty Word that made them.

Brute Creatures may behold thefe viffible things perhaps with fharper Eyes than us, but Spiritual Objects are fo farr out of their reach, as if they had no being; neareft therefore to Beafts, are those men, who fuffer themfelves to be led wholly by their Sences, as to beleive nothing but what is fuggested by the purblind and unfaithful Informer; let fuch men doubt whither they have a Soul in their Body or no, becaufe their Eyes never faw it. or that there are any Stars in the Firmament at noon day. because they appear not, or that there is any Air wherein they breath, becaufe nothing appears to them, but an Infenfible Vacuity; furely all that know they have Souls must of necessity beleive the rule and government of Angels, which they fee not : If from no other grounds, yet out of that Anology, which they cannot but find between this leffer and the greater World, for as this little World Man, confifts of an outward viffible Body, and an inward Spiritual Soul, which gives Life and Motion to that organical Frame, fo possessing all parts, that it is wholly in all, and in each part wholly; fo must it be also in the great Universe, the sensible and material part whereof hath be-

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ing and moving from those Spiritual Powers, both Supream and Subordinate, which dwell in it, and also fill and actuate it, therefore every rational Man looks about with no other Eyes than St. Paul's in2. Cor. 4. 18. We look not at the things which are scen, but at the things which are not seen: for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are not seen are temporal.

There is multiplicity enough of wonders in the vifible World, but the fpiritual and intelligable World, is that which is more worthy to take up our Hearts, both as we are Men indued with Reafon, and allo that the Infinite Goodnefs hath been pleafed to enlighten our Eyes, to Contemplate on things above: So I shall conclude this Difcourse with the words of St. Paul Rom. 1. 20. For the Invisible things of him from the Creation of the World, are clearly seen, being understood, by the things that are made, even his Eternal Power and Gcd-head.

Thus Courteous Reader I have done what I thought fit at this time, and I hope have given that Light, which may ferve to conduct any one thro' the darkest passage in the whole Doctrine of Aftrology; and I with you as much Felicity in reading, as I have had in pening of it : I have had but little affiftance in the composing of it, only I must acknowledg, I am engaged to the Ingenious Mr. Coley, for helping me to Placidus's Primum Mobile, from whence I took the Doctrine of Directions, that are incerted in the first Part, from page 86. to page 117. by the affiftance of my Ingenious Friend 'Mr. Cordwell Worrall, but for the fecond part, I have done without any affiftance. only the method of the Tables of Twilight, but I have quite altered them, and for the Tables of Afpects, and Semid. and Seminoct. Arches, with the Tables of Houfes I have calculated de novo: and for my Difcourse all along, if I have given offence to any perfor I at heartily forry, affuring

affuring you I meant no harm, hoping you will make your favourable conftructions from my good intentions, for what I have done, have been really for a faithful Information: Now to the only Wife Creator of Heaven and Earth, be all Praife (whom I moft humbly Implore, for a Bleffing upon his moft Sacred Majeftie, and all the Royal Family, and my Countries Good in general) which I fhall ever defire whilf I am,

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The Use of these Tables of Twilight.

The first Colume, on the left hand, is the Parallel of *Twilight*; the Body of the Table shows the diffance that the Sun must be from the Afcen.or 7th House, to make those Parallels; so that when you use them the Work is thus, First, Take the Ob. afc. of the Afcen. under the Pole of the Birth, from whence substract the Old. afc. of the Sun, so you have his primary diffance, which seek in the Table in the nearest Degree the o is in, and having found it, see in the Colume toward the left hand, and see what Parallel answers to it, and under the fame Parallel take out the Arch of Twilight for the Promittor: Also fee the Example of Gustavus Adolphus King of Sweden, and the Duke of Parma, which will sufficiently inform you in the Use.

The Use of the following Tables.

IN the first Colume is the Semidiurnal, or Siminotturnal Arches, from 3 Hours, to 9 Hours, and is Calculated to every 6 Minutes; now over against the Semidiurnal Arch, in a direct Line, is the space of the House, that that Seminotturnal or Diurnal Arches gives; with all the Mindane Aspets, truly Calculated, to the very Degree and Minute, which is sometimes twice as much as at other times, and the reason is, because the Seminotturnal and Semidiurnal Arches are sometimes to much longer than at other times, or a

COURTEOUS READER

Altrology, concerning the Parallels in the Marrow of both by Motion and Position, and have incerted a Way how to take them; yet the Rule there, being not plain enough to be underftood, unless by those that are well vers'd in that Way, I have here for the fakes of all Ingenious Perfons, explained the fame more fully by fome Examples, and observe that those Parallels are as powerful as any Afpect whatfoever; for indeed they are Afpects, being made when two Planets come to be equally diftant from any of the four Angles, as if one be upon the Cufp of the 11th. and another upon the Cufp of the 9th. Houfe, they are in Parallel, as being equally diftant from the 10th. Houfe, fo likewife is one upon the 11th. in parallel to one upon the 3d., being equally distant from the Afcendant; alfo a Planet by being placed upon the 11th. is in Parallel to one upon the 5th. House, as being either of them equally diffant from the 10th, and 4th. observe the fame Rule in all the reft; now thefe last mentioned are Parallels by their Polition. But if one Planet should be upon the the 9th. House and another upon the 12th. they are not in Parallel, but by the Motion of the Primum Mo-Aa

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Mobile they will be brought to that equal diffance, that one shall be just to far pass the Mid-heaven, as the other wants to it, which when they are so, they are in exact parallel: Also if 2 Planets be placed in the 11th. or 12th. by the Motion of the Primum Mobile, the will be brought to that equality of distance to be in exact Parallels: As if two Planets should be thus placed, one in 12 Degrees, and another in 16 Degrees of the same Sign, when the 14th. Degree comes to be upon the Cusp of the Midheaven, the Parallel is then made; because they are both just 2 Degrees distant from the Mid-heaven, observe the fame Rule by any of the four Angles, and because these Parallels are hard to find, I will here shew how you shall take them, and the exactes and best way, is thus.

First. Take the Declination of that which is nearest to the Angle that you take it from, with the Latitude, then observe the Degree of the Ecliptick that answers thereunto, and having found it, take the femidiurnal or feminocturnal Arch, according as the Planet is placed above or under the Earth; for if it be above the Earth, then take the femidiurnal Arch, and always observe that Rule or elfe you will commit great Errors; fo having done this in the Star or Planet nearest the Angle, do in all the like respects with that which is farthest off; which when you have obtained, add the two Arches together, then take the distance from the Angle with this Caution; that if it be from the Ascendant, take the distance by oblique Affension, if from the 7th. by oblique Descension, or the oblique Ascension of the opposite Point: But if from the Mid-heaven or 4th. House, by right Ascension, which diftance Call the primary diftance, then take the difference of Right or oblique Afcenfion of the two Planets, by fubstracting the one from the other; then by the Rule of Proportion fay, if the two Arches give that dife.

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difference of right or oblique Afcenfion, what shall the femidiurnal or feminocturnal Arch of that Planet give which is neareft the Angle? and the product shall be the fecondary, right, or oblique Afcention, which observe. that if the Planets be placed one before the Angle, and the other after it, then fubilitate the primary diffance of that which is nearest the Angle from the secondary distance, and the remainder is the arch of Direction, which is to be equated according to the method expressed in the Marrow of Astrology; but if both Planets are placed thort of the Cufp of the Houfe, then add the primary diffance to the fecondary distance, and you will have the arch of direction, which is to be equated as before; and obferve, that when any Significator comes the Parallel of ψ or φ . and they be well placed in the Nativity, there Parallels are most Famous, and bring as good effects as their Sextile or Trine, but when a Significator, especially the Giver of Life, comes to the Parallel of the Lord of the 4th. or 8th. it most Certainly denotes Death; if to the Lord of any other Houfe being evilly placed gives a great deal of Croffes and Vexations, according to the nature of the Houle that they govern, but if well placed it Signifies a great increase of Felicity, according to the nature c? the Houfe that the promittor is Lord of; and obferve, that these Parallelsare always made by the motion of the Primum mobile from East to West, and this Rule being fo plain, a little Practice will make it very eafy, neither can it be taught any plainer ; the best way for to equate will be by the Table of Logistical Logarithms, fuch as are in Mr. Coly's Clavis, or Mr. Streets, or which you pleafe, now as to Parallels of declination, I need not fay any thing of them, becaufe I have done it in the Marrow of Aftrology; only take Notice, that they are nothing but the true Antifcions, only in taking them observe the Latt.

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as is Taught in the first part, p. 118, fo that I need not repeat it here again.

In the next place I shall explain the Mundane Aspects, which are very confiderable to be observed in a Nativity; now the Mundane Afpects do not confift of any certain number of Degrees, but are fomtimes fhorter or longer, according to the femidiurnal or feminocturnal Arches, there has been mention made of these Aspects in the Marrow of Aftrology, yet there is no Rule for the certain finding of them, and I had thoughts of taking the feveral Poles of Pollitions, and fo to have added the Mundane Afpects to the Bodies, and by them to have had the true Arch of Direction: And to that end I calculated a Table of all the Afpects, but I found that would not answer the end Lintended it for : but however it will be of good use, as shall be explained in its proper place, now here shall be shewn how the Aspects in the World only depend upon the femidiurnal and feminocturnal Arches, and the way of taking them, with the greateft eafe imaginable, fo that the meaneft Capacity may understand it which is thus.

First, If you were to direct the Mid-heaven to a * of any Star, that is placed either in the 12th. Afcendant, or 2d. you have only this to do, to take the oblique Afcenfion of the Cufp of 12th. Houfe, under his proper Pole, and under the fame Pole the oblique Afcention of the Promittor, fubftract the one from the other, and fo you will have the Arch of Direction; for obferve, that when the Cufp of the 12th. is directed to the body of any Planet, at the fame time the Mid-heaven comes to the *, and when the Afcendant comes to the body of any Star, at the fame time the Mid-heaven is directed to the \Box thereof, and when the Cufp of the 2d. Houfe is directed to the body of a Star, then the Mid-heaven comes to the \triangle , and

and always obferve this Rul?, and then you will never Err; for these Aspects in the World are not made by their distance in Signs, Degrees, and Minutes, but by their distance by Houses, according to the semidiurnal or feminocturnal Arches.

Secondly. The fame Rule is to be observed in the Afcendant that was in the Mid-heaven, for if you were to direct the Afcendant to a *, you have no more to do then to direct the Cufp of the 11th. if the Promittor be above the Earth, or the Cusp of the 3d. if he be under the Earth, to his Body, which when either are directed thereto, the Afcendant at the fame time comes to the *. and if you were to direct the Afcendant to a \Box , obferve if the Promittor be above the Earth, direct the Mid-heaven to his Body, but if under the Earth, direct the Cufp of the 4th. to his Body, either of which bring the Afcendant to his D; but if you were to direct the Ascendant to a \triangle , observe if the Promittor be above the Earth, direct the 9th. Houfe to his Body, if under the Earth direct the 5th. to his Body, which when either come thereto. the Afcendant at the fame time come to his \triangle , fo you may direct any of the Angles with a great deal eafe, and exactness; for having found the Cusp of the House, direct under the Pole of that Houfe let the Star be placed where it will; now for the division of the Heavens to find the true Cusps, I am of the opinion of Placidus, who faith, the Heavens ought to be divided only by the femidiurnal and feminocturnal Arches, which I shall explain by an example here following, and now come to fpeak, how any Significator may be directed to a Promittor in the World.

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The true Method of directing any Significator to a Promittor, either Direct or Converse.

First, Observe if they are both near the Cusps of Houfes: what hath been faid concerning the Ascendant or Mid-heaven, may ferve here, for 'tis only to bring them both to the Cusps of the Houses that they are placed upon, or very near, and it makes the Aspect that is between the Houses; how the Houses behold one another you may see in the Marrow, &c. Page the 22. 23. &c. of the second part, but if they be farther off, you must observe these directions.

That if your Significator be placed in the 10th. Houfe, and were to be directed to the * of a Promittor in the 12th. or 8th. House, first take the distance of your Significator in R. A. from the 10th. House, which call the primary distance, then take the distance of your Promittor from the Cufp of the 12th. House, which referve; then take the femidiurnal Arch of your Significator, and alfo of of the Promittor, then add the two Arches together; and fay by the Rule of Proportion, if two Arches give the distance of the Promittor from the 12th. House, what shall rhe femidiurnal Arch of the Significator give, which when you have found, add it to the primary distance of your Significator, the fum is the Arch of Direction; but observe this. If the Significator had been placed beyond the Culp of the 10th. House, in the 9th. House, then you fhould fubftract the primary diftance from the fecondary, and the remainder is the Arch of Direction, use the fame method if the Promittor be in the Afcendant for the Afpect: But if the Promittor be in the 2d. or 6th. then by the fame Rule you will have the △, always obferving to take the feminocturnal Arch, if they are under the Earth ; Earth; this one Rule is fo plain and eafy, that it were but Tautology to repeat any more.

Now concerning the Afpects that are made Converfe, which is only by making the Promittor Significator, as if the Significator were placed in the 11t. Houle, and the Promittor in the 12th. the * will fall in the 10th. Houfe; now to direct the Significator being in the 11th. into the 10th. is contrary to the fucceffion of both the Houfes and Signs, therefore the beft way to direct the Promittor to the * of the Significator, which will fall in the Afcendant, juft with the fame Rules,only taking the Promittor for Significator, which a little Practice will make very eafy; I need fay no more of the Parallels and Afpects in the World, until I fhew fome examples thereon, which fhall be by the following Nativity, which I will mannage according to Ptolomy's Doctrine, the method follows.

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Here you may fee that neither δ nor \mathfrak{P} have any parallel of Declination, becaufe by their lattitude they are beyond the Ecliptick, therefore can have no Antifcion, altho' many have incerted the contrary; these in the Speculum are only such Aspects as are made in the Zodiact, as for those in the World, they are taken from the figure it felf, so that they need not be put into the Speculum; next I shall give an account of this Nativity in generall, then shew how the directions are wrought; which is thus. B 2

A Certain Gentleman was Born November the 17th. 1664. at forty two Minutes past 4 of the Clock in the Morning, for which time I have set the Figure by the Tables in the Marrow, &c.
