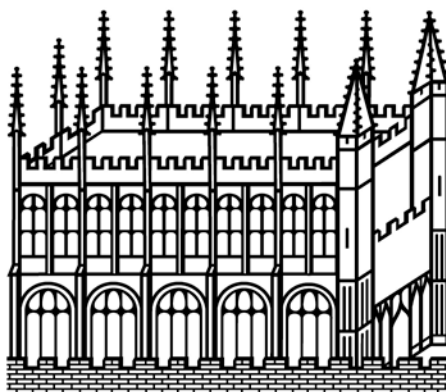

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PREFACE.

THE plates offered to the public in this book are reproductions by a photozincographic process of part of a manuscript in the Bodleian Library at Oxford marked 'Bodl. 13,' which was presented to the library on July 28, 1630 by John More. Their chief interest lies in the fact that they are the earliest representations of the Colleges and public buildings of the University. The following is a sketch of the circumstances attending their original production.

On two occasions Queen Elizabeth visited Oxford, in 1566 and in 1592. The Queen's favourite, the Earl of Leicester, had in 1564 been elected Chancellor of the University, and the plan that she should herself accompany the Chancellor to Oxford in that year was only put off on account of the plague in the city. At last however on Saturday Aug. 31, 1566, the Queen came from Woodstock in royal state and entered the city. For seven days she was entertained with a round of sight-seeing, disputations and plays, of which full accounts have been preserved.

On Thursday, Sept. 5, as the Queen was on her way as usual, after dinner, to hear disputations in St. Mary's, her attention was arrested by a large map or

set of views of the Colleges with Latin verses under each, which was posted on the walls or gate of the Church. This was the joint production of Thomas Neale, the Regius Professor of Hebrew, and John Bereblock of Exeter College, the former of whom was ready to explain the details of the map, so soon as he had delivered himself of a Hebrew speech (see p. 39 of this book) congratulating Her Majesty on the occasion. The Queen was pleased to accept a copy of the views, and according to a not quite impartial narrator of the event, namely Bereblock himself, 'seemed to regard the gift as the greatest and best that she had ever received.' The map itself remained hung up for several days, and was more than once noticed by the Queen. A careful copy, which is probably the MS. now in the Bodleian, was made by Neale, but the map itself is lost sight of till it, or a very similar one, was presented by William Nutburne of St. John's to his college. The two authors were indeed specially connected with that society, Bereblock having been a commoner and fellow of it, while Neale had not only shared in the munificence of Sir Thomas White, but also had seen his uncle chosen to be the first President of the new foundation. There the map remained till, in 1616, the College granted it to Sir Thomas Lake, principal secretary of state to James I, who 'thereupon' presented the College with £20 for repair of their buildings. Whether this precious relic of Elizabethan Oxford survived the Civil War we cannot tell.

The following may serve as a short account of the

authors of this book. Thomas Neale, born at Yate in Gloucestershire, and educated at Winchester and New College (Fellow of New College, 1540; B. A. May 16, 1542; M. A. 1546; B. D. July 23, 1556) was a man of considerable repute in his time for theological and especially Hebrew learning. In the reign of Mary he was chaplain to Bishop Bonner and rector of Thenford, Northants, but on Elizabeth's accession he came back to Oxford, and from 1559 to 1569 held the Hebrew professorship; but 'his religion'¹ being more Catholic than Protestant, he left Oxon as he had done his lecture before; and being of a timorous nature and always dreading his being called in question for his seldom frequenting the church and receiving the sacrament, he retired to Cassington' where he passed the remainder of his life.

John Bereblock, a native of Kent, at first connected with St. John's College (B. A. March 29, 1561; M. A. Feb. 13, 1566) and afterwards fellow of Exeter, was chiefly distinguished as a draughtsman and artist.

NOTES.

A. *The Views.*

The views of the Colleges were first engraved, from this MS., in 'Henrici Dodwelli de parma equestri Woodwardiana dissertatio. Accedit Thomæ Neli Dialogus inter reginam Elizabetham & Robertum Dudleium comitem Leycestriæ & academiæ Oxoniensis cancellarium, in quo de academiæ ædificiis præclare agitur. Recensuit ediditque Tho. Hearne.' Oxonii, e theatro Sheldoniano, 1713. This work, owing to some expressions in the first part which were considered to be offensive by the authorities of the University, was suppressed, but subsequently Hearne was allowed to issue the Dialogus separately. (See *Letters written by eminent persons . . . from the originals in the Bodleian Library . . .*, Lond., 1813, vol. i., pp. 252-258.)

The views were again engraved in 1728 by Robert Whittlesey and used as borders of a reproduction of Agas's View of Oxford. Of this rare engraving a few copies were reproduced by photozincography in 1881.

A few have been separately re-engraved, but not from the MS., in various recent histories of Oxford ¹.

B. *The Dialogue.*

The metrical dialogue was first printed without the author's name in M[iles] W[indsore]'s *Academiæ . . . catalogus*, Lond. 1590, with the title 'Chronographia sive origo colle-

giorum Oxoniensis academiae, vñ cum descriptione eorundem ad serenissimam Elizabetham Angliæ Franciæ Hybernæ reginam, &c. conscripta, 1566.' In this work the Colleges appear in their proper order, as the Latin verses show, namely Ch. Ch., New, Magdalen, All Souls', C. C. C., Merton, Oriel, Queen's, &c., while in the MS. and in Hearne's edition the order is Ch. Ch., Oriel, C. C. C., Merton, New, Magdalen, All Souls', Queen's, &c. In the true order the basis of arrangement, after the first three, which are singled out as the more magnificent Colleges, is clearly topographical.

The Dialogue is again printed in the MS. order in John Nichols's *Progresses . . . of Qu. Elizabeth*, Lond. 1823, vol. i., pp. 217 et seqq.

D. *Queen Elizabeth's visit to Oxford.*

There are two contemporary accounts, (1) Brit. Mus. Harl. MS. 7033 'Of the actes done at Oxford when the Queen's Majesty was there, collected and noted by Nicholas Robinson' afterwards bishop of Bangor: in Latin, printed in Nichols's *Progresses*, as above, vol. i., pp. 229 et seqq. (Robinson declares Neale to be the artist as well as the poet, as indeed Wood seems to suggest.) (2) 'Commentarii de rebus gestis Oxoniæ ibidem commorante Elizabetha regina A.D. 1566,' printed from a MS. in Hearne's possession at the end of the *Historia vitæ et regni Ricardi II*, ed. Hearne, Oxon. 1729. (This account is distinctly assigned by the editor, on grounds

which we do not know, to John Bereblock, and contains the only original evidence that Bereblock was the author of the views:—‘*eas formas Berebokus ex collegio Exoniensi calamo suo fecit.*’) See also Wood’s *History and Antiquities*, as above, vol. ii., Oxf. 1796, pp. 154 et seqq. (= *Annals*, sub anno 1566), and Nichols’s *Progresses*, as above, vol. i., pp. 206 et seqq. E. *The Manuscript.*

The MS. is a small quarto volume containing (1) the Dialogue here reproduced, written about 1566; (2) John Fisher the Bishop of Rochester’s speech before Henry VII at Cambridge in 1506; and (3) an Italian version of Psalms 1–25, probably by one of the family of Gentilis. These three are separate treatises, and were not bound together till the seventeenth century.
